Commodore's Comment by Peter Whitaker

We extend a warm welcome to new members, new trainees and volunteers, and our winter sailors. We are honoured to have you all with us and I hope your time with us will meet all your expectations. This year 17 persons have and are participating in our sail-training programme. That is great news and we are indebted to the lead trainers Ray, Jon and Paul and their support staff for the success of the training programme.

As I write I hear the wind and rain on the roof and have just seen the snow on our Victorian mountains on TV - winter is here. It also means the lake will fill up. Of course winter means cold weather and windy conditions. We need to give careful consideration to our dress. If you are not a wetsuit owner like me, the first layer of clothing is important. It needs to be a material that wicks water away from your skin like wool or a suitable synthetic material. And one needs a windbreaker and a beanie. Discuss what you should wear with a few 'ole salts', and consider how your body reacts to cold. I am one who doesn't believe you need a wetsuit. I'm just indicating -that a wetsuit is not a necessity and there are other ways of managing the loss of body heat. What is not an option is the intelligent management of the loss of body heat. It happens so beware.

Experienced sailors please note that when we are racing we should be mindful of the new sailors. A conversation the other day reminded me of my own fears when I was learning to sail. It wasn't so much the 'bottling' – I got quite experienced at handling that – it is the fear of getting tangled up with other boats: being a nuisance and damaging other craft. The basic rule of sailing is that we should

avoid collisions, but there is something more basic in our club sailing: the support and encouragement of new sailors – watching out for them in every sense of the word.

This takes me to the notion of having a sailing-buddy. A gentle sharing about ways of depowering our sails, managing gusts, and other tips about improving our sailing. Certainly I am grateful to those in the Solo fleet who took me under their wing in my early days of learning to sail.

The Club is progressing well. Our finances are in good shape. Things are slowly being achieved around the property. We will be hosting the Winter Sail Regatta over the weekend of July 10-12. Our leadership team has a new recruit in Zoe Baranowski who will be managing the hiring of the hall. Thank you Zoe for putting your hand up. Anne Wells, our Social Secretary, is planning our Summer Presentation evening for June 1st.

It's has been some time since the last Impulse report. If nothing else that time frame has given me plenty of material. First we have bid farewell to a long time club member, Terry Hart, who is planning to spend more time pursuing other interests. Terry has been a member of our club for way too long and could always be counted on to assist in the running of the club's bigger events and to also help as a trainer or principle race officer. I can still remember our AGM when Terry was the treasurer; Mr Hart gave the most eloquent explanation how the newly introduced GST (good Sailing Tax) would affect each and every one of us. With any luck we maybe able to get Terry back at some time. Jon Pulham has purchased True Red so the red boat is still at the club.

We have a few new faces in the Impulse class and we welcome Michael and Shane who have both purchased their own boats, plus Dean who is chartering the Flying Oyster. All three are learning what it's like to sail the sports car of the lake.

Over the Christmas New Year period the APYC was the most represented club at the Australian Championships held at Wangi Sailing Club on the waters of Lake Macquarie. This strange name town of Wangi Wangi is around 1000 kilometres from Albert Park so it was great to have 9 out of the 46 entries coming from our club. In the mix of the 46 were 5 juniors with three of them from our club, so APYC was the best represented club. Wangi has a few claims to fame being the town where the Archibald artist William Dobell lived. For the sailing fraternity it is the home club of Olympic gold medal winner Nathan Outteridge. Nathan's father was our principal race officer so sailing must be the family sport. The event was won by a New South Welshman Michael Brown in a fine example of light to medium winds. Browny normally favours heavy conditions but finished with a score of 8 in a 10 race series. Our Dougal Watt came in with a second. Mike Howell came in second in the great grand master. Alyssa claimed first place in the Impulse 6.6 and is proving that this smaller sail works well with the lighter skippers. There were 5 juniors at these nationals which is a great sign for the class.

Then after a good show at top of the bay the Impulse states were held at Balnarring, a great place for camping and sailing. Although the series was held in light winds it attracted thirty one entries with our club being represented by seven of those. Yep APYC did it again by being the best represented club. Of the three juniors sailing two were from our club. The juniors trophy went to Harrison from Portarlington in 365 a boat know to APYC sailors as "The Flying Gherkin" but now call Minimus. At the top of the table was Natasha Van Rennes who ended up with an impressive score of 5 out of 6 races. These top Impulse sailors like to get things right over a whole series. Dougal Watt was our best placed in at third. The big news was our commodore after sailing his boat En Bateau for just on one year took out first Great Grand Master, well done Peter. I am sure Peter will be able to give you the full report on how he did it.



Vale Ken Wellman a tribute from Norm Hammon

Ken Wellman passed away on 21st. March this year after suffering with Parkinson's disease for a few years. Ken and his wife Judith moved from their Brighton home into a nursing home in Parkdale, and Judith remains there in nursing care, and is suffering Dementia. Both joined our Club in about the mid 60s, when they introduced their children, Chris and Elizabeth into sailing, and were very good supporters of our Club. Ken built both children a Sabot Class boat, and they excelled in class competition. Both went through Moths and Impulse classes, as Ken built yachts and encouraged each in class sailing.

Ken started his yachting at the St. Kilda 14 foot Sailing Club. On the beach near the back of Luna Park. He sailed with some great names in sailing such as the Brookes, Osborne etc. He graduated into the Flying Dutchman Class sailed out of the Royal St. Kilda Yacht squadron, and became an Honorary Life Member of the Club.

Ken and his sailing mate from R.M.Y.S. built and sailed a beautiful timber keelboat "Delta" with success including a couple of west coast races to Hobart. His interests were split between the R.M.Y. S and his children at our Club. This was fortunate for me, as he became my crew on Fireball, and his experience was invaluable. This was proved when we were both repairing and sailing "Acrospire" as he made one feel confident with his vast knowledge. He was a very quiet man and a very good mate.

Ken was also renowned for his ability to fast skate on ice, which he learned at St. Moritz skating rink in St. Kilda. This led to him playing ice hockey in the local competition, and later represented Australia in Olympic ice hockey in the winter games in America in the 1950s. You had to squeeze this sort of information from Ken, as he was silent about his attributes.

Ken ran a wholesale fruit supply branch in the Fruit Market on Footscray Rd, and started work at 2.00am throughout the week. However he never showed signs of tiredness.

His ability for work at Club working bees was much appreciated

A Painting of Acrospire purchased for the Club

It was a February evening of this year that I was doing my normal search on EBay for all things yachty, something I've done for years. Just for fun that night I searched up Albert Park Lake to see what would come up. Imagine my surprise when I read the following...

Albert Park Lake painting with sailing boat and swans.

This is an Interesting HISTORICAL Original FRAMED Watercolour Painting by Australian Artist, FRANCIS, (FRANK), LATIMER, (1886 - 1974). It is framed, and is signed lower right, and dated 1949. It shows a Lovely Painting of "ALBERT PARK LAKE", in Melbourne, Victoria. This painting was done in 1949. It shows a Yacht on the lake, along with Swans, and the Palm Trees around the lake, with a faint view of buildings in the City in the distance. It is framed.

LATIMER, Francis; (born Melbourne 1886, died Melbourne 1974) was a photographer and painter in water colour and oils. He had studied at the National Gallery School in Victoria been a member of the Victorian Artists Society and had lived at Black Rock, Victoria, for most of his life.

Latimer has exhibited in the Crouch Prize, 1953; at the Athenaeum Gallery 1943, and the Sedon Gallery, 1944, with Nora Gurdon, Will Dyson, and Charles Wheeler. His Art is represented in the Australian war Museum, Canberra, Australian National Gallery, and the National Gallery of Victoria, along with Regional and Private Collections around Australia.

The painting is in good condition, on card, and measures 14 5/8 inch by 8 7/8 inch, (37.1cm \times 22.5cm). (Image). The frame is 17 inch by 11 inch, (43.2cm \times 27.9cm). The price was \$199 or offers.

I was pretty sure on looking at this work that it was Acrospire or a boat like it. It seemed to be moored more around where the duck weed is on the other side of the restaurant but I couldn't be sure. Although faded it is in good condition and is a lovely watercolour of what Chris and others think is Acrospire as it was rigged then. However in the 1950s there were other boats on the lake like it so we can't be 100% sure. Anyhow I put an offer in of \$100 and it was accepted plus post and along it came a week later in a shocking looking frame and no glass. I took it along to our Commodore and other members one Saturday. Peter was very interested and said the Club would recompense me the money and I could get it re-framed.

So very soon this lovely work by a relatively famous Australian artist and local to Melbourne will be hanging in our Club rooms. I hope all the members enjoy it into the fu-

ture.
