

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















Vale: Ehren Hyde

1994-2019.

Before I met Ehren at a Pacer State Championships in 2017, I heard about him. On the water I'd seen this young man crewing for Paul and I had no idea who it could be.

I ran through some possibilities. A new trainee in our Learn to Sail? I didn't think so. Perhaps a relative of Pauls? Unlikely; not much family resemblance there. Perhaps a local sailor from the host club? That was probably it. Satisfied with my reasoning I nevertheless asked Dad midway through the regatta if he knew who was crewing for Paul. He said, "Oh that's Ehren, you know Ehren". "no..." "You know Ehren, he's a club member". I had no idea who he was, which was strange because I seldom missed a week sailing and I knew everyone at the club. If he was a member he must have only been around for a week or so. The thing was, Dad, and later Paul when I saw him later, were speaking about Ehren as though he'd been around for years. Finally meeting him at the end of the regatta, I understood why.

Ehren was instantly comfortable to talk to. He could be both cheekily playful and yet incredibly insightful and serious in the same conversation. These qualities enabled Ehren to fit right in with people of any age and with all sorts of interests.

The shared interest that brought Ehren to us was a love of sailing. Initially he enrolled in an intermediate Learn to Sail class to brush up on rusty skills, but he very quickly transitioned to helping his fellow students. Seeing this Paul and I as chief Instructors with the club approached Ehren about becoming an Instructor. Ehren didn't hesitate to agree and from then on he was a highly valued member of our Learn to Sail team.

Beyond learning to sail many new sailors take the option of borrowing club owned boats with an experienced sailor from the club on board. I run a weekly matching service for members and also manage

the hire of club boats. There is a wind limit of 18 knots beyond which we don't allow club boats to be sailed, although the club will race in up to 26 knots. We had a lot of enthusiastic kids who'd just learned to sail and a very windy season last year, and many was the time when a young sailor would come up to me and ask to take a boat out, and I'd say 'no way, it's much too windy', and they'd go away for a bit and then come back and say, 'Ehren said he'd take me out', and I'd say 'that's fine then'. Ehren was one of maybe 3 sailors on my list who I would trust to handle a boat with children on board in those winds. I think the kids disliked me, but they loved Ehren. They'd come in after the race with big grins on their faces. The same could be said of many of the adults who sailed with Ehren.

Ehren was keen to expand his knowledge of sailing and boats, not only by reading and listening to others but by the age old method of jumping in and giving it a go, learning by experience as he went. Not long after joining the club he took it upon himself to fix a troublesome leak in the club's wooden Sabre, Beethoven, which he often sailed. He purchased paint, varnish and sandpaper, scrounged some fiberglass from the club store, and with only a few tips from helpful old sea dogs, over the course of a month did a very thorough job of stripping the floor back, sanding, filling, fibre-glassing and repainting. The floor looked great, however much to Ehren's frustration, it still leaked! Back to the workshop, he had another go and the second time around it floated.

Perhaps partly because he now understood some of the work involved in maintaining a wooden boat, in a move that annoyed most of the Sabre sailors in the club who'd been trying to persuade him to buy a Sabre, Ehren bought himself a Laser. Solid fibre-glass, no painting, no sanding necessary. And capable of punching a hole in any wooden Sabre without suffering a scratch. No wonder they were upset! But of course they forgave him. Ehren loved his Laser, spending literally hours on the water at a time in it, practicing various manoeuvres and just generally having a

good time. Once in the summer he came in after about 4 hours with the reddest sunburn I'd ever seen on his legs. After that experience he was very careful to keep well covered against the sun.

Ehren had an adventurous spirit. He was one of those people who you'd assume would have to own hiking shoes and a tent at the very least, and probably abseiling gear and a hang glider in his loungeroom. I was therefore quite surprised to discover in the week before an Easter camping weekend that he didn't actually own a tent (I never asked about the hang glider in the loungeroom but I'm sure it was there). So for the weekend of the Lake Boga Easter Sailing Regatta Ehren shared a tent with our Vice Commodore Glen Currie and 2 of Glen's children, Max and Lachie. Ehren raced his Laser, Glen and the boys swapped around in their Pacer and I raced my Impulse. When he wasn't on the water Ehren was intently playing card games with the Curries and me, inventing new rules for board games, and managing to get heavily involved in a sort of role playing fantasy card game some of the local teenagers were playing. The kids absolutely loved Ehren's company. In between games Ehren and I would discuss sailing race rules and tactics.

On the water there were about 5 other Laser sailors racing, a couple of whom were quite good sailors.

After the first race in which Ehren had finished 4th,

the top sailor, Albert, came over and helpfully started giving Ehren advice. I left them to it and went to get some lunch but they were discussing the boat for some time. Ehren then went out and won the second race by a country mile. That was the end of the advice! Unfortunately Ehren didn't realise race 3 was to follow immediately on from race 2, and he went ashore thinking that was it for the day. Because he was so far in front he didn't realise everyone else was finishing and then hanging around the finish line waiting for the next start. Ehren was annoyed at himself for that but the race win outweighed that annoyance – he was stoked.

These have been some few of the fond memories I have of Ehren. There is not a person at this club who doesn't have happy memories of their own. There are sailors at other clubs who have known Ehren briefly, some possibly wouldn't even have known him by name, but would have good memories of him all the same. It's those memories that we need to hold onto, and not dwell on what might have been. It is often said, some people live more in 2 years that others live in 20 years. Ehren, you were certainly one of the former, it was a pleasure to spend some of that time with you.

The Victorian Pacer Championships were held at Beaumaris Y.C. with a fleet of 17 boats. The first 2 races had good racing conditions of around 10 knots. APYC boat results for the day were 'Good Pace' Skippered by Paul Taig & Crewed by Emma Taig with two 4th placings, 'Pacheetah Magic' Skippered by Isabella Wood & crewed by Geoff Wood with a 9th & 6th placings.

The next day in the morning saw no racing due to no wind, so we all had lunch waiting for the breeze to build.

In the afternoon the breeze built up to 25 knots. That saw half the fleet not leave the shore and those who went out were in for a rough ride with the breeze reaching 30 knots with racing quickly abandoned. Emma and I headed back to shore getting some good surfing rides along with Isabella and Geoff. The wind dropped to around 6 knots with a huge swell left over from the storm that saw two races completed for the day. The results for APYC boats were 'Good Pace' 9th & 6th placings and 'Pacheetah Magic' 4th & 8th placings.

Back at the lake saw the water level drop to the point of suspending the Winter Series Racing until the water level returned to a level for our Start boat & Rescue boats to operate properly. We are now back racing due to some good rain over the past weeks. During the low water level we were able to run some windward and return social racing from the scouts pier that everyone enjoyed. We now also have a new boat launching facility.

With the tragic death of Ehren who in his first month of joining the Club crewed for me at the 2017 Pacer State Titles at Parkdale Y.C. 

Letter to Ray Wines

I have been going through information I had kept on my time at Albert Park Yacht Club. In January 1974 I visited APYC with the aim of joining the Club. I met two senior members, Jim Paxton and Arthur Palmer. They told me that the Club was not taking any new members and that I would have to be put on the waiting list.

I sent a letter to Hon Secretary Peter Mitchell requesting I be put on the waiting list. After some months I received a letter from Peter Mitchell stating that the Club was accepting a few new members at the next Committee Meeting and with any luck yours will be one name to be considered. However, the Committee had decided that all applicants must be interviewed by an official of the Club before they can be considered and pay the \$10 nomination fee. Finally on 7 June, 1974 I became a member of the APYC.

I was a member of the Club for 5 years with my final year's membership in 1979. During my time as a member I received regular copies of the Newsletter 'On The Lake' which were mailed to my home.

In the October 1977 On The Lake newsletter there was a reference to Australian Solo Champion Angus Gordon. Ernie Warnes introduced Jim Paxton to Angus Gordon and Paxton asked Gordon if he had done any sailing and Gordon replied that he had. Ernie Warnes then blurted out that this gentleman is Angus Gordon from New South Wales and he is the Australian Solo Champion. Paxton said he was sorry for not hearing Gordon's name. In September a special Solo meeting was held and the guest speaker was Angus Gordon. He was excellent, modest, but full of good ideas re Solo sailing. Angus was going to the Antarctic to be in charge of the base called Mawson for one year, leaving on 2 December, 1977.

In the December 1977 newsletter among the applicants for membership were James Hindhaugh and Jan, Katie, Thomas and Nicholas Hindhaugh. I had suggested to Doctor Hindhaugh, (my doctor) that as he was interested in sailing he should join the APYC.

In the December 1977 newsletter under Solo News is the following announcement: "I am pleased to report that Dan Elisha of the APYC has bought the Solo named 'Solotude' from Don Sutherland, and is already sailing on Wednesdays with DADS NAVY. We also had some interesting visits from others also interested in the class. Senior members Jim Paxton and Arthur Palmer sailed as DADS NAVY - Jim Paxton, Class Captain."

After I sold Solo yacht Solotude, I purchased Solo 2164 Escape from Angus Gordon, the Australian Solo Champion. I had to travel to Sydney for the purchase and bring back the yacht and trailer to Melbourne. I continued to sail Escape with the Club until I resigned from the Club in 1979.

In April 1978 the Victorian Solo Association announced that the Arthur Palmer Perpetual Trophy for 1978 will be sailed over five heats at Albert Park Lake in conjunction with the Albert Park Yacht Club Frost Bite Regatta and Winter Program. This is open to all Victorian Solo Association members.

In the April 1976 newsletter there was detail on the Sail-a-Thon program. Jim Paxton, Captain Solo Class wrote that the Sail-a-Thon was a gigantic success and a wonderfully organised event which ran so smoothly due to the efforts made by all. During the Sail-a-Thon seventeen Solos were seen sailing over the two days. The Solo Skipper who put on a wonderful show was Arthur Palmer who sailed 24 laps, the result being he is unable to sit down ever since. Don Sutherland beat Arthur Palmer, Don sailed the whole 24 hours, an even greater effort.

A June 1978 Notice to Members made the following announcements: "Annual Subscriptions for 1978/1979 have been increased. The planned commencement of the Club's rebuilding program early in the new Club year will pose an immediate and continuing drain on the Club's resources. The Club will break even only in 1977/1978.

"Work is about to start on the extension and remodeling of our Clubhouse building. Cost of the project is estimated at \$45,000. To finance the work the Club will need to borrow \$25,000. The Committee of Management is prepared to make the loan funds available but will require guarantees from Club members covering the loan amounts."

In the February 1979 newsletter Jim Paxton celebrated his 79th birthday. Jim is the oldest member still sailing regularly.

The following announcement was made in the November 1978 newsletter: "Albert Park Yacht Club has challenged Ballarat Yacht Club in a return match of Acrospire and Valdera to be sailed on Albert Park Lake on Saturday 10 February and Sunday 11 February, 1979."

The previous match race was held at the lake in Ballarat. I took my father to this match race as he had sailed in Acrospire. With all the heats in the two race meetings, I cannot recall which yacht was the overall winner at each location.

During my last year with the Club in 1979 I sold my Solo Escape and resigned from the Club and the Victorian Solo Association. I received a letter from John Burgess, Hon Secretary on my resignation.

Yes, its Winter, are you going to be warm enough, do you have wetsuit, gloves, sailing shoes, helmet, life jacket (that fits well), sunglasses and water. Give yourselves enough time to set up the boat, check all your fastenings and that your tiller and centreboard are secured to the boat.

Remember, if you are in trouble on the water, raise one hand, wave or shout to the rescue boat and they will come and attend to you. If your boat does flip over, don't panic, trust your life jacket, point the boat into the wind and follow your recovery procedures.

These simple rules are there to help you, a new sailor, or someone older or disabled who needs the shorter course that we offer Green Racers. It is designed to make you feel comfortable, to give you peace of mind so you can achieve your best on the water.

We are very lucky on the lake to have these wonderful facilities, with keen volunteers who are there to keep you safe and happy so you can become a better sailor.

This of course applies to all classes. Preparation, confidence and practice on the lake leads to results in improving your racing.





Maybe he did not wish to beat Sir Donald's average?


It was in my role as club captain that I was lucky enough to get to know Keith better. I initially had to ask what the role entailed? The short answer was "it's easy, you just have to organise a couple of working bees a year to keep on top of the maintenance. Just keep Keith on side and it's no problem".

Well by this time Keith's sailing days were winding down he was sailing the last Sabre he had built and was having trouble getting out of his boat. Keith was ready to retire from racing but not the sport that had given him so much pleasure and enjoyment for him and his family.

Around this time the club added the Port Lounge, Keith managed to paint the whole club after the works where finished under the strict colour guidance of Carrol Wines.

Once this was done the commodore of the day came up with a great idea!





The club needed a new 'Keith' This sort of worked, but Keith really did not have the patience to be a teacher and tended to sneak up to the club and do the work himself. That is if you can call a 100 kilometre round trip from home to the club and back sneaking.

All through these side projects Keith managed to keep our fleet of 20-30 club boats in working order with repairs, painting plus meeting any trades on site for specialised jobs like servicing the power boats. Try as they might the committee wanted to make Keith an honorary member for all the work he did around the club. But in the Keith Ives fashion he would not have a bar of it. He would say "Sailing has given me so much pleasure over the years the least I can do is pay my subs".

With one of the hottest, driest summers on record, the water levels went down, down, down.


Brian Jones, as Race Secretary, kept a close eye on the water depth to asses the declining ability to conduct racing on the lake.
